diamond.

In the symbolic language of jewels, a sapphire in a wedding ring means marital happiness. A pearl engagement ring is said to be bad luck because its shape echoes that of a tear.

Snake rings dotted with ruby eyes were popular wedding bands in Victorian England -- the coils winding into a circle symbolized eternity. Aquamarine represents marital harmony and is said to ensure a long, happy marriage.—I like this one as my own is diamonds and Aquamarine ahh
